

CHURCH OF THE BRETHREN DISTRICT CONFERENCE

On September 21-23, representatives of the congregations of the Pacific Northwest District of the Church of the Brethren gathered at Camp Myrtlewood in southern Oregon to handle the business of the district. This informal crowd gathered in a circle in a cabin and shared worship and insight into how we as a district body can move forward in our present reality. Representing Olympic View Community Church were myself, Roger and Kathy Edmark, and Frosty Wilkerson.

Dominating a large part of our discussion was the retirement of our District Executive Colleen Michael in August of 2019, and how we should move forward in looking to fill the role of District Executive. As Colleen pointed out, her service, as well

as those of the two Area Ministers, is made financially viable by their choice to forgo various benefits and reimbursements they are eligible to claim. As approving a budget for the next year is also a function of District Conference, this led to a wider discussion of how we can handle the business of the district body with the limited resources at our disposal. It was decided to form a committee to envision creative wavs in which we can perform the traditional functions of the District Executive without necessarily having a dedicated, paid employee, and how we move forward in a financially viable way.

The 2019 budget was provisionally approved at the 2018 level, and the Gifts Discernment committee was tasked with approaching individuals to serve on the new committee. In addition, a variety of open positions at the district level were filled, with the exception of the Board Chair, which remained vacant at the close of the meeting.

The final session involved an overview of the Compelling Vision Process that has been initiated by the denomination, to seek input from as many people as possible across the wider church into what we can agree to as a compelling vision for the larger church to work together on going into the future. (Olympic View will be hosting a session in early April with the denomination's General Secretary David Steele.) Closing worship included a blessing for district leadership and the congregations served by the district.

CROP WALK

Olympic View participated in CROP hunger walk on October 7, 2018. The task is straightforward: walk around one of Seattle's favorite walking trails, the 2.8-mile path around Green Lake. Carry signs promoting CROP walk and the awareness of hunger. Bring pledges and money to donate. Connect with the other walkers, and interact with people from the general public along the trail.

It was raining as we left the church, but the light drizzle stopped as we arrived at Green Lake United Methodist Church to gather with other CROP walkers. We had more walkers than any other church. Those walkers included: Glenn Brumbaugh, Harriet, Jeremiah, Matthew, Max, Caitlin, Janay, Wanya, Kiasherae, Brooke, Joanna, Taushie, and Jonathan. Most of the group were teens, and it's very impressive that every single one of them walked the whole distance on the first day of "normal" fall weather.

CROP has been around for a very long time. It was started in 1947 as a project of Church World Service to raise money to help midwestern farmers send surplus grain overseas to areas of poverty related to the end of WWII. The acronym stands for Christian Rural Overseas Program. Things have changed a lot since then, but the concept remains: to make a grass roots connection between those people who have a surplus of food, and those who need food and can't get enough. A quarter of the money goes to serve local organizations, and the rest is distributed abroad. In Seattle, CROP walk supports North Helpline, Food Lifeline, and the food banks in West Seattle and White Center. Around the world, CROP supports people in Guatemala, Haiti, Serbia, Miramar, Bosnia, Georgia, and Moldova.
