Annual Conference

The 233rd Annual Conference of the Church of the Brethren was held in Greensboro, North Carolina from July 3-7. This year they suspended all business to focus on a compelling vision for the future. There were three areas of visioning:

- How congregations are serving and ministering through their life together. How can the denomination equip and support churches as they embody Christ's ministry in local settings.
- How can we come together as many congregations, joining hands to engage in mission and ministry that is bigger than any one congregation can accomplish on its own.
- How can we transform and better manage the division and conflict that has been a barrier to our full effectiveness in ministry as the Church of the Brethren.

We spent a lot of time talking to each other around the tables about our churches and the communities they serve. Each table had an iPad that was connected to a server that recorded individual written responses. The facilitator would as a question of the entire delegation, and each person typed in their own response. My table consisted of a mix of progressive and conservative congregations, and what we found was that we could enjoy each other and listen to one another as long as we didn't try to convince the other person to change their views on matters

of disagreement. I suppose the biggest question is whether that is okay. It was fantastic to spend time with people who had different theologies and different world views. On the internet it often devolves into insults and shaming, but with facilitated discussion in real life we tend to show respect for each other. Here are some quotes from the process:

"We also need to learn how NOT to work together. We don't do that as brethren very well. We need to be okay with where each others passions are and not put an expectation on others or other churches that can't."

"The work of Brethren Disaster Ministries is another project that is important. As one in our group said, "You don't have to agree on the 'transubstantiation' in order to ask another, 'could you hand me that hammer, please?' "It is truly the work of the Lord when we are together helping others in need."

"Be an example for other denominations in our ideas, faith, actions without every person being in full agreement. Being OK agreeing to disagree but still love as Jesus did."

"We need more direct instruction in how to speak about salvation and our faith - we are good at providing the help."

"Every congregation is called to develop a local effort focused on systemic issues of violence and injustice in their own area... On their area of passion. Developing imagination, skills, and commitment. This can add effort and energy to our necessary service ministries, but go beyond them to work at shifting root causes in your area. CoB denomination builds a massive new fund to give grants and equips churches to create these efforts."



Kathy and Roger in Hiroshima

Hello to everyone from Hiroshima! Our first week was a whirlwind of activity. First, we were being trained about all of the tasks we would be involved in while also having a quite full house at World Friendship Center. In our first full week here, a typhoon swept through the area closing all of the railways down and stranding some of our guests for extra days. We have seven guest rooms here, most of which can accommodate two guests. So for a couple of days we had 14 guests and both sets of directors. The typhoon was mostly just very heavy rain, but Kathy and I had to get to the store to get food for the groups

breakfasts a couple of times.

In case you do not know much about World Friendship Center, it is a bed and breakfast center for peace, where atomic bomb survivors, "Hibakusha", can tell their story about the day the bomb was dropped. They are heart wrenching, often emotional stories of survival. I just read one yesterday about a young girl who was the only survivor in a school of over 400 children and teachers. Guests can request a Hibakusha story as well as a guided tour of the Peace Park along with other activities.

Back to breakfast shopping. Our only transportation options are walking to stores and carrying everything back, or, riding our bicycles which each have two baskets to carry items. We are starting to get used to riding the bikes. Luckily, the area we live in is all flat. We have mostly dodged the rain, but a couple of times we got a bit wet before we got back.

We were so busy early on, that we had no opportunities to get out to see the city. Finally a few days ago we had some time so we went to the Peace Park Museum; to a calligraphy exhibit at the Hiroshima Prefectural Art Museum; to a wonderful garden, Shukkeien; and to Hiroshima Castle.

We start conversational English language classes next week - they had taken a break in August. We also met for the first time, the Fuchu Church. The Fuchu Church is the organization which guaranteed our stay in Japan for our Visa. We will teach adult Sunday school twice a month and participate in children's activities as well.

We have been greeted warmly by the former directors, Barb and Dannie, by the Japanese board ("The Riji"), the staff we work with, and all of the volunteers as well. It has also been a joy to meet guests and participate in telling the story of the World Friendship Center to them. Since we have been here we have met seven groups from France, two from Italy and one from the USA. This is also a great place to eat if you like Japanese food - duh! Tempera, Raman, Tonkatsu, Yakatori, Sushi, Sashimi and Okonomiaki, a specialty that is only cooked correctly in Hiroshima according to the local restaurateurs. Yumm!
