Opening Hymn "Comfort, Comfort O My People" 176 Advent Candle Lighting Litany (Responsive)

- Reader 1: Last week we lit the first candle, inviting God's awakening Spirit to accompany us during Advent.
- Reader 2: Today we light the second candle, which calls us to welcome each other as Christ has welcomed us.

People: How we long to bask in God's extravagant welcome!

- Reader 2: In God's peaceable kin-dom, violence is overcome by relationships of understanding and respect.
- Reader 1: A spirit of wisdom prevails, breaking down borderlands of hostility and fear.

People: How we long to embrace one another in harmony!

- Reader 2: In God's vision of justice, no one is poor, no one oppresses another.

 Reader 1: God's peace showers upon us as fresh as spring rain delivering hope from a season of drought.
- People: How we long to welcome God's reign of peace! Come, Holy One, and prepare a way in the wilderness of our need and longing.

Gospel Reading Mark 1:1-8

The beginning of the good news of Jesus Christ, the Son of God.

As it is written in the prophet Isaiah, "See, I am sending my messenger ahead of you, who will prepare your way;

the voice of one crying out in the wilderness: 'Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight,'"

John the baptizer appeared in the wilderness, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins.

And people from the whole Judean countryside and all the people of Jerusalem were going out to him, and were baptized by him in the river Jordan, confessing their sins.

Now John was clothed with camel's hair, with a leather belt around his waist, and he ate locusts and wild honey.

He proclaimed, "The one who is more powerful than I is coming after me; I am not worthy to stoop down and untie the thong of his sandals.

I have baptized you with water; but he will baptize you with the Holy Spirit."

Old Testament Reading Isaiah 40:1-11 NSRV

Comfort, O comfort my people, says your God.

Speak tenderly to Jerusalem, and cry to her that she has served her term, that her penalty is paid, that she has received from the Lord's hand double for all her sins.

A voice cries out: "In the wilderness prepare the way of the Lord, make straight in the desert a highway for our God.

Every valley shall be lifted up, and every mountain and hill be made low; the uneven ground shall become level, and the rough places a plain.

Then the glory of the Lord shall be revealed, and all people shall see it together, for the mouth of the Lord has spoken."

A voice says, "Cry out!" And I said, "What shall I cry?" All people are grass, their constancy is like the flower of the field.

The grass withers, the flower fades; but the word of our God will stand forever.

Call to Serve

We know that the daylight will shift, that the weather will change, but in this moment, O God, help us to settle deep into this season.
